Whereas in pursuance of a Warrant from the Proprietaries dated the 16<sup>th</sup> day of March 1735 there was surveyed on the 2<sup>d</sup> day of June 1739 unto Richard Hoff a tract of land situate in the Township of Paxtang in the County of Lancaster but the said Richard Hoff not complying with the Conditions of the said Warrant the same, together with the survey made as afores<sup>d</sup> are become utterly void -

Now in pursuance of a Warrant from the Proprietaries dated the first day of June 1741 requiring me to make a Return of the land surveyed as aforesaid in order the same may be granted & confirmed to James Alcorn I do hereby certify that the metes & bounds are as follow  
 Viz<sup>t</sup> Beginning at an Elm tree at a corner of John Cowry's land & extending thence by the same south east one hundred & sixteen perches to a post thence by John Cowry's land north six degrees East twenty five perches to a Chestnut Oak and north fifty two degrees East forty perches to a Hickory tree and north thirty degrees East seven perches to a white oak thence by Jacob Kitzlemburg's land and by Margaret Kelsy north three degrees East two hundred forty one perches to a Dogwood tree thence by James Reichel's land west one hundred & twenty perches to a Chestnut Oak thence by land surveyed for the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Thomas Deny Esq<sup>r</sup> one of the said Proprietaries south by West ninety one perches to a black Oak and south one hundred and thirty two perches to the place of beginning containing one hundred ninety nine acres and the allowance of six acres per cent for roads & returned into the Secretary's Office the first day of June 1741
