



By virtue of a warrant from the Proprietaries dated ye 27th day of June, A.D. 1738 Surveyed the 4th. day of June, Anno Dom: 1740 To Andrew Coughron, the above tract of land Situate in the Township of Paxton in the County of Lancaster, Beginning at a white oak, thence South 57 Degrees East 125  $\frac{1}{2}$   $\frac{1}{2}$  to a hickory, thence south 80 degrees East 157  $\frac{1}{2}$  to a Spanish oak thence South 23 degrees West 177  $\frac{1}{2}$   $\frac{1}{2}$  to a white oak, thence North 80 degrees West 194  $\frac{1}{2}$  to a post thence north 225  $\frac{1}{2}$  to ye place of beginning containing 247 acres & ye allowance of six acres  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent. for Roads and High ways.
