



A Draught of the Land of David Morton in Calconhook in y^e Township of Darby in Chester County p^r Beginning at a post at the Corner of an Orchard Field near the Creek Thence South 84 Degrees East 19 1/2 P. to the Creek of Darby then up y^e same on y^e several Courses thereof 127 perches to John Davis's Meadow then North 5 1/2 West by the same along a Ditch 42 1/2 P. to a Stake then North 5 1/2 East 5 3/4 P. to a post and Rail fence then along the same North 38 East 13 pers. then North 73 3/4 East 16 1/2 P. thence North 56 1/2 East 12 7/10 P. then North 30 East 22 7/10 P. then North 54 East 7 9/10 P. to a White Oak tree by a turn of the Creek then up the same 24 P. to a small Maple thence North 23 degrees West 89 3/4 P. to a small White Oak Skimp then South 67 deg West 88 3/4 P. to a stake then North 26 West 5 3/4 P. to a Street Gum then South 63 degrees West 29 7/10 P. by y^e Land of Andrew Boon and Andrew Wren 48 1/2 to a small Black Oak then ^{to a red oak then south 2 1/2 East by y^e lands of Andrew Boon} Line 76 East by y^e Land of Conrad Neithernmark 30 perches to y^e Corner of a fence then by y^e same along the right of the lane South 7 1/2 West 128 perches to a Stone at y^e Corner of s^t Conrad's Shop then ^{2253 n 10 feet} Line 24 y^e Right along the Cross Lane 10 feet then by y^e s^t Conrad's Land Line 5 West 17 perches to y^e place of Beginning Containing One Hundred and twenty acres. Survey'd y^e 17 of 3rd 1734.

Since this Survey the s^t A.D. is out of the above described Tract to Conrad Neithernmark being formerly sold & included within a Tract of David Morton's Convey'd to s^t Conrad by Deed And so it is Return'd into the Secretary's Office the 1st of 9th mo 1734.
