



A Draught of Two Tracts of Land situate in Maccungy Township in the County of Northampton and Province of Pennsylvania, taken up by Christian Keww (all Keww) Being Part of Two larger Tracts. The above Two Parts thereof are by the said Christian Keww already conveyed to his son George Keww.

The first being Part of a Tract of 50 acres of allowance Surveyed by Warrant of the 17<sup>th</sup> June 1745 .... Beginning at a stone in the line of John Treplers Land. Thence by the same North 75<sup>deg</sup> East 96 perches to a stone. Thence by his said other Land. South 15<sup>deg</sup> East. 53. perches to a stone, and South 75<sup>deg</sup> West. 96 perches to a stone. Thence by Philip Keeblers Part thereof North 15<sup>deg</sup> West 53 perches to the Place of Beginning. Containing Thirty acres of Land with the usual allowance.

The second being Part of a Tract of 49<sup>a</sup> 94 perches of Land, and Beginning at a stone a corner of the abovesaid Tract. Thence by Vacant Land North 75<sup>deg</sup> East 20 perches to a stone, and South 15<sup>deg</sup> East. 103. perches to a stone. Thence by the same and by Land of Late Ludwig Lermsh. South 75<sup>deg</sup> West 116<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> perches to a stone. Thence by the said Philip Keeblers part thereof North 15<sup>deg</sup> West. 50 perches to a stone. Thence by the said George Keww's above described Tract. North 75<sup>deg</sup> East 96. perches to a stone, and North 15<sup>deg</sup> West 53. perches. to the Place of Beginning. Containing Forty Acres and 84 Perches of Land with the usual Allowance. Containing together Seventy Acres and 84 Perches of Land together with the usual Allowance at Six per Cent for Roads.
