On Conversing with Mr. McDonell who is now present I Recollect that the Original Copy mentioned, or described the Land to
 lie on the East side of Georges Creek & he alledged an Error in the Copying of the Original Entry and would not agree to have
 it executed agreeable to the Copy and he afterward furnished me with a Copy of the Original Certifying the land applied for
 to be on each side of said Creek, which was the cause of delay in Executing his Order for a Considerable time, until the Opposition
 of Government oblige it impracticable.
