The red lines represent part of a Survey made for John Holliday on Warrant dated the 21<sup>st</sup> day of February 1793 — This survey interferes one hundred and forty eight acres and fifty one perches with the Peter Tenyn Survey — Peter Tenyn conveyed to John Baynton, Samuel Wharton & George Morgan from whom the title descended to Michael F. Simpson, who conveyed to John Holliday who had obtained the aforesaid Warrant, and afterwards conveyed to James Alexander the present owner — The green lines represent a survey made for Thomas L. Dunn on warrant, dated the 21<sup>st</sup> day of February 1793 — This tract interferes one hundred and thirty two acres and fifty four perches with the Peter Tenyn survey — Peter Tenyn conveyed to Baynton, Wharton & Morgan from whom the title descended to Michael F. Simpson who conveyed to John Holliday to whom Thomas L. Dunn had conveyed — John Holliday conveyed to James Alexander the present owner —

No. 1 represented by dotted lines is the draught of a Survey made for Joseph Hollingshead on order No. 414, dated the 1<sup>st</sup> day of August 1766 — This Survey interferes Two hundred acres and fifty five perches with the Peter Tenyn survey, Joseph Hollingshead conveyed to Baynton, Wharton & Morgan who also claimed under Peter Tenyn. It descended from them to Michael F. Simpson who conveyed to George Tetter who conveyed to Thomas Snyder the present owner — he also conveyed to John Holliday who conveyed to James Alexander the present owner —

No. 2 represented by dotted lines is the draught of a Survey made for James Scott on order No. 411 dated the 1<sup>st</sup> day of August 1766. This Survey interferes one Hundred and sixty nine acres and one Hundred and fifteen perches with Peter Tenyn Survey — James Scott conveyed to Baynton, Wharton & Morgan who claimed under Peter Tenyn. It descended from them to Michael F. Simpson who conveyed to John Holliday who conveyed to James Alexander the present owner.
