



Situate in Shrewsbury Township York County, and Containing as above set forth 22^{as} 95^{ps} & allowance of land; Being a part of a larger tract of 37^{as} 78^{ps} & allowance of land called "Coal pit," which together with two other tracts, one called "Deer Chase" containing 32^{as} 34^{ps} & allowance, the other called "Ground Oak hill" containing 16^{as} 70^{ps} & allowance, were all surveyed by William Kersey late D.S. on the 3rd & 5th Days of the 2nd mo. 1790 in pursuance of one Warrant, bearing date the 16th of October 1787. The above described part was Resurveyed and divided off from the said whole tract called Coal pit, on the 24th day of October 1798. And now, after having been carefully examined, Corrected and Calculated, it is at the request of the present owner Jacob Brillhart, returned for Confirmation the 27th day of August Anno Domini 1810.
