



By Virtue of a Warrant from the Proprietaries Dated the Twentieth day of April Anno Domini 1736 Surveyed on the Twenty sixth day of the same month To Andrew Gallbreath a Tract of Land Situate in the Township of Donegal in the County of Lancaster Beginning at a Spanish Oak in the line of Richard Allison's land thence North 70 Deg East 42 perches to a post N 43 Deg East 56 p to a post N 67 E 44 p to B.O. N 57 1/2 Deg East 183 p to a hickory N 50 Deg West 74 perches to B.O. South 56 Deg West 131 p to a Maple standing by the side of a Branch of Little Sycasalonge Creek thence up the Courses of the said Branch 147 p to a white Oak thence S. W. 148 p to W. Oak then South 40 Deg East 116 p to the place of Beginning Containing Two Hundred & twelve acres & a half and the allowance of Six p. for Roads & Highways Surveyed for S. A. Blunston Dep. Surt.

one hundred acres part hereof was laid out & Returned in part of 2400<sup>ac</sup> granted to James Steel in right of Wm. Manschauer Warrant Dated the 26<sup>th</sup> of March 1733 the other 112<sup>ac</sup> in part Returned to the 30<sup>th</sup> of April 1737
