



Situate in Allegany Township in the County of Huntington between the Allegany Mountain and Bald Eagle Ridge on both sides of the little Juniata - Containing eight hundred and ninety acres and one hundred and forty seven perches and the usual allowance for Roads - Re-Surveyed on the eighth day of August one thousand eight hundred and two; In pursuance of an order Number 1579 dated the eighteenth day of October one thousand seven hundred and sixty six granted to Hugh Tomb and of an order of the Board of Property dated the seventh day of June 1802

Note. I think the land contained in the above Draft was taken in by the original Survey a copy of which is in your office or in the Board of Properties papers although some of the Lines cannot be found and an evident mistake has been made in the calculation and there is some inaccuracy in laying down the waters which I suppose to have arisen from some of the Lines not being run on the ground; but plotted - there is also a mistake in the Course from the Sugar Tree near a H.O. old corner fell down; to the Hickory new corner it being found on the ground S 86 1/4 West one hundred and fifty seven perches 0 5 1/2 c r a t c d. Draft is N 8 1/4 West - from the Hickory the line continues and the marks found N 86 1/4 West by part of Hugh Tombes by William Brown Andrew McNeely and Robert Caldwell's track - to his Hickory corner fell down with the marks yet to be seen - The White oak corner of Tomb's tract is found standing, and from thence to the post another corner of Tomb N 55 W 23 1/4 perches is well marked, from thence to the Sugar Tree near a White Oak old corner it is S 3 3/4 W 260 the old Draft it is said to be S 6 E 251 - this line is also well marked
