



A Draught of seventy three acres and seventy four perches of land with six per Cent for roads situate in Greenwood Township in Mifflin county. Surveyed 15th May 1812 in pursuance of a warrant to William McAlister Esq^r dated 8th May 1812.

Notes. The red dotted lines running into and from the above draught represents fences of an old field of William McAlister Esquire the Warrantee above named, and the black dotted lines running thro' represents a great road and the red dotted line near said road represents a fence of Warrantees old field, and the space contained between that fence and the line bearing S. 75 W. upon which Warrantees house is built, is that part of the said old field upon which the right of Warrantees Warrant rests, and contains about five acres, his said house is sufficiently large and commodious for a very small family, and was occupied by a Tenant at the time of making the above survey, and was built in the month of Jan^y last past ~~1811~~ by John Kelly's improvement, his house, in which he resided at the time the above survey was made, was of sufficient size for accommodation of small family to live, in covered with boards, one door, one window, chimney not then made out, in which were a bed and clothing with other household furniture and, I think, was built in April last; and a field of about 4 acres, under fence, bearing its first crop which was wheat beautifully growing which must have been sowed in the fall of the year 1811. That part, Coloured was surveyed & returned into the S^g Office in pursuance of a Warrant to John Brubaker dated 16th Sep^r 1811, but which, return and Warrant ~~are~~ made void by a Decision of the board of Property of the 4th May 1812!
