We whose names are hereunto Subscribed have been at, and Viewed the Ground above set forth, and made the Survey. Containing Seven Acres and one Quarter. Whereon there is Soil. Susceptable of Cultivation, and whereon there is now Corn Growing. We are not able by any Enquirey which we can Make that any part of the above draught Ever was Surveyed Previous to the Year 1776. There are also Some Improvements made Respecting a Fishery on the above Premises and it appears that no part of the above plot will ever Impede or Obstruct the Navigation of the Susquehanna - Either at high or low Water. And that the nearest distance of the above plot is forty Two perches from the York County Shore. And we are of Opinion that the above Quantity of land is not worth more than Three pounds & Acre.
