



Surveyed the above described Tract of Land Containing 377 Acres 68 perches Situate in Drummore Township Lancaster County being part of 740 Acres & all<sup>cs</sup> according to Resurvey thereof made the 2<sup>d</sup> December 1773 in order to describe the Same at one view and including divers tracts of Land or former Surveys now in the possession of James Morrison Viz one Surveyed the 24 October 1741 to John Thompson for about 220 Acres by Warrant (or order from William Parsons Surveyor General bearing date the 16 October 1741 which was purchased by Daniel McConnel, who Obtained an Additional Warrant 22<sup>d</sup> October 1745 & sold his Right and possession of the whole in both Surveys to Joseph Morrison & Samuel his Brother, 2<sup>d</sup> Another Tract of 100 Acres & Allow<sup>cs</sup> -- Surveyed in 1741 to Elizabeth Morrison their Mother by Warrant dated 2<sup>d</sup> July 1741. 3<sup>d</sup> Another Tract to said Joseph Morrison Surveyed the same Year & called 77 Acres by Warrant granted to James Gilcrest dated about the same time and the Remainder about 313 Acres was in divers latter additional Surveys for the said<sup>s</sup> Joseph & Samuel Morrison viz 50 Acres in Right of a Warrant purchased of William Steel Dated 12 October 1745 and of two other Warrants obtained by the said Joseph Morrison the first of them dated 24 May 1749 and the last 17 April 1752 by George Churchman — August 31<sup>st</sup> 1809.
