



Situate in Cumberland Township (now Franklin) York County and surveyed the 25<sup>th</sup> day of May 1787 in pursuance of a Warrant for 200<sup>ac</sup> Granted to John Grate dated December 10<sup>th</sup> 1775 By Moses McClean D.D.

Shortly after John Grate obtained the aforesaid Warrant he put it into the hands of Arch<sup>d</sup> McClean D.D. for Execution. McClean knowing that the Lands described were that part of the Lands of John & James McCleary which lay in Cumberland Township & on which there was not one foot of improved Land - he under those Circumstances informed said McCleary of said Warrant, when they to avoid a Law suit purchased said Warrant. As the American War took place soon after and an almost suspension of the business of surveying the Warrant was not then Executed. In May 1780 at the Request of James McCleary & James Cummins Executor of J<sup>rs</sup> Dec<sup>d</sup> I surveyed and divided the whole Lands - And in May 1787 after my appointment as D<sup>r</sup> D<sup>r</sup> & the Papers of Arch<sup>d</sup> McClean coming into my hands with John Grates Warrant I returned the whole Tract stating the particular situation as to Grates Warrant & the Settlement of the Lands on the Hamilton side of the Creek - John Ross (who purchased the Lands of J<sup>rs</sup> of John McCleary and which has sold and obligated to make a sufficient Title to the Purchaser) informs me he cannot obtain a Patent in the manner the Return is made - I have therefore ascertained the Quantity of that part of the Lands in Cumberland (now Franklin Township) Township which John Grates Warrant calls for, as laid down on this Draught. Certified this 15<sup>th</sup> Day of March 1799
