



By Virtue of a Warrant from the proprietaries dated the 19th day of October 1731 Surveyed unto John Page of Austin Fryers London Gent. ~ the 29th day of April 1733 A Tract of Land Situate on a Branch of Tulpehocken Creek in the County of Lancaster Beginning at a Small Black Oak at a corner of Gulielma Maria Fell's land thence West by South by vacant Land 480 perches to a post, thence South South East by Vacant Land 640 perches to a white oak thence East by Vacant Land 617 perches to a post thence North by vacant Land 265 perches to a post thence West by the Land of the s^d Gulielma Maria Fell 140 perches to a Hickery ~ Thence West by North by the Same Land 256 perches to a White Oak ~ Thence North by the Land of the s^d Gulielma Maria Fell 370 perches to the place of Beginning Containing two thousand & one hundred Acres.
