



Situate on the South side of the middle or Beaver Dam Branch of the Frankstown Branch of Juniatta about one mile south from Hollidaysburg in Frankstown township, Huntingdon County containing three hundred and twenty seven acres and allowance of six per cent. Surveyed the 15th June 1767 for Samuel Litton on order No. 481 dated the 1st day of August, 1766.

To Jacob Spangler Esqr. S.G. Thomas Woods Pat'd Timothy McTirley not Pat'd Daniel Africa D.S.

The purple coulered lines, represent part of the draught of a tract of land surveyed for Thomas Woods on Warrant dated the 20th day of September 1762 this tract interferes eighty four acres and eighty five perches with the Samuel Litton Survey. Thomas Woods conveyed to George Woods and John Baynton, Samuel Wharton and George Morgan. John Baynton's interest was sold by the Sheriff of Huntingdon County to Michal F. Simpson, George Morgan conveyed to Benjm Wyrcoop who conveyed to M. F. Simpson, Samuel Wharton's interest was sold by Benjm Wyrcoop as Assignee of said Wharton to M. F. Simpson who abandoned his claim to the interference. George Woods appears to have abandoned his claim also. No. 1 and 2 represent the draught of a tract of land surveyed for Timothy McTirley on warrant dated the 3th day of March 1763. This tract interferes one hundred and ninety five acres and one hundred and fifty eight perches with the Samuel Litton survey. No. 1 was recovered by Henry Drinter who claimed under Samuel Litton from Adam Holliday who claimed under Timothy McTirley. No 2 was held by Adam Holliday, Timothy McTirley conveyed to Richard Tea who conveyed to George Woods who conveyed to Adam Holliday who devised the same to William Holliday the present owner.

IN TESTIMONY that the above is a copy of the original remaining on file in the Department of Internal Affairs of Pennsylvania, made conformably to an Act of Assembly approved the 16th day of February, 1833, I have hereunto set my Hand and caused the Seal of said Department to be affixed at Harrisburg, this
