



Situate on waters of Little Juniatta River in Antis township Huntingdon County Containing three hundred and thirty one acres and allowance of six percent first surveyed the 1st day of April, 1767 and resurveyed the 9th day of January 1818 for Charles Mc Guire on order No. 2623 dated the 29th day of January 1767.

No. 1 represented by a dotted line is part of a survey made for John Swarts on warrant dated the 7th January 1797. This survey interferes nine acres and one hundred and thirty perches with the Charles Mc Guire survey. John Swarts conveyed to James More the present owner. No. 2 represented by dotted lines is part of a survey made for George Ward on warrant dated the 28th day of February 1785. This survey interferes ninety three acres and sixty six perches with the Charles Mc Guire survey. George Ward conveyed to George Duffield who devised the same to his heirs who conveyed to Michael Wallace the present owner. No. 3 represented by dotted lines is the draught of a survey made for George Duffield on warrant dated the 28th day of Febry 1785. This survey interferes two hundred and twenty one acres and sixty three perches with the Charles Mc Guire tract. George Duffield devised the same to his heirs who conveyed to John Smith the present owner. No. 4 represented by a dotted line is part of the draught of a survey made for George Duffield Senr on warrant dated the 28th day of February 1785 this survey interferes six and one half acres with the Charles Mc Guire survey. George Duffield devised to his heirs who conveyed to William Ahe the present owner.
