The part marked B is covered and included in a tract of 395 as. Patented to James Galbreath 17 Sept. 1746. See patent Book A Vol. 13, page 383. The part marked C is covered and included in a tract of 330 as. Survey'd 29 Oct'r 1768 on an order of Survey to Alice Adams dated 4 December 1767 No. 4633. The part A owned by Robert Davis under the patent founded on & Wm. Davis heirs & Christian Myers warrant to William Kitchpatrick tenant on the land Jacob Reed. The part B owned & occupied by Solomon Cernor under pat. to Galbreath. The part C owned and occupied by Christian Myers & John Stump under patent founded on order to Alice Adams.
