



Situate in Turkey now Scotch Valley in Frankstown township Huntingdon County Containing one hundred and eighty one acres and twenty eight perches and allowance of six per cent. Surveyed for John Leshar on order No. 768 dated the 4th day of August, 1766. Daniel Africa D.S.

To Jacob Spangler Esqr. S. G. No. 329. Pat'd. Danl Grant, Pat'd. John Proctor, No. 328, not Pat'd. John Bartleton Pat'd.

The purple colored lines represent the Draught of a tract of land surveyed for James Glen on order No. 329 dated the 1st day of August 1766. This tract interferes one hundred and forty six acres with the John Leshar survey. James Glen conveyed to William Trent. The green lines represent part of a survey made for John Proctor on order No. 328 dated the 1st day of August 1766. This tract interferes forty nine acres and forty three perches with the John Leshar survey. John Proctor conveyed to William Trent, who conveyed to Simon Gratz, who conveyed to James Smith who devised the same to James Smith the present owner. No. 1. represented by dotted lines is part of the Draught of a tract of land surveyed to Daniel Grant on Warrant dated the 29th November 1762. This tract interferes eighty four acres with the John Leshar survey. Daniel Grant conveyed to John Little, John Lutrens and George Woods. John Little & John Lutrens conveyed to George Woods, whose heirs sold to Alexander Johnston who conveyed to Thomas More the present owner. No. 2. represented by dotted lines is part of the draught of a tract of land surveyed for John Bartlet on Warrant dated the 20th September 1762. This tract interferes four acres and one hundred and twenty two perches with the John Leshar survey. John Bartlet conveyed to John Little, John Lutrens and George Woods. John Little and John Lutrens conveyed to George Woods, whose heirs sold to Alexander Johnston who conveyed to Thomas More the present owner.
