



The dotted lines in the above diagram including the letters A. B. C. & D. & E. represent a survey made to Joseph Culbertson on the 20th of February 1828, a return whereof is herewith enclosed. The dates of the above surveys are set down in the above drafts respectively. It will be seen that the location of Joseph Culbertson has been laid upon the ground called for. It includes the Old Indian Town on the bank of the Conemaugh, which is (as I am informed by the oldest inhabitants) the only place known by that name in that part of the Country. It also adjoins Alex. Culbertson which is laid in part upon the Survey in the name of William Beard. It appears from information that these were lands claimed by Culbertson in this part of the Country shortly after the Revolutionary War but has long since been abandoned, there is therefore now, no person claiming under the title of Joseph Culbertson that I can find. The tract is owned and occupied by by John Peters and John Loughry who hold under the title of Frederick Boyer.
