



Pennsylvania ss

By virtue of a warrant from the Proprietaries dated the 18<sup>th</sup> day of August 1741. I have surveyed on the same day several pieces of the 5<sup>d</sup> Proprietaries ground, hereafter described, to be and remain open forever for the use of a publick Market under the direction of the Mayor & Commonalty of the City aforesaid. That is to say One piece of ground situate on the east side of the second street from Delaware Bank bounded westward by the said second street northward by a lot of Ground formerly of John, Margaret, William, & Ann Charlotte Lowthers, now in tenure of Joseph Wharton, eastward by the said Proprietaries other ground and southward by Cedar Street w<sup>ch</sup> is the southernmost Street of the 5<sup>d</sup> City containing in length north & south two hundred fifty two feet & in breadth east & west forty feet.

No. 1.

Another piece of ground situate on the west side of the 5<sup>d</sup> second street bounded eastw<sup>d</sup> by the 5<sup>d</sup> second street, northw<sup>d</sup> by a lot formerly of Lowthers afores<sup>d</sup> now of Edward Shippen, westward by other ground of the 5<sup>d</sup> Proprietaries & southward by Cedar Street containing in length north & south two hundred ~~and~~ <sup>fifty two</sup> feet & in breadth east & west forty feet.

No. 2.

Another piece of ground situate on the west side of the 5<sup>d</sup> second Street bounded northward by Pine Street, eastward by Second Street, southward by a lot formerly of the German Company & westward by other ground of the said Proprietaries containing in length north & south one hundred & two feet & in breadth east & west forty feet. Returned into the Secretary's office the 10<sup>th</sup> day of August 1741.

IN TESTIMONY that the above is a copy of the original remaining on file in the Department of Internal Affairs of Pennsylvania, made conformably to an Act of Assembly approved the 16th day of February, 1833, I have hereunto set my Hand and caused the Seal of said Department to be affixed at Harrisburg, this
