Conrad Hersner conveyed to John McClelland who conveyed to Edward Mannor who conveyed to Capt^l William Huston whose Administrator conveyed to Thomas Stevens who conveyed to John Hess who devised the same to John Hess the present owner

No. 2 represented by dotted lines is part of the draft of a tract of land surveyed for Frederick Hager on warrant dated the 16th day of April, 1798. this tract interferes one hundred and seven acres with the James Mitchell survey James Mitchell conveyed to James McClintney who conveyed to John Oaks who conveyed to Joseph Higgins who conveyed to Jacob Hendershot who conveyed to Frederick Hager who obtained the aforesaid warrant and whose Administrator conveyed to Joseph Pittman the present owner

No. 3 represented by dotted lines is part of the draft of a tract of land surveyed for Richard Stevens on warrant dated the 7th day of June, 1804, this tract interferes thirty three acres and ninety two perches with the James Mitchell survey. Richard Stevens conveyed to Thomas Stevens whose Executor conveyed to John Hess who devised the same to John Hess the present owner
