

Land Office 13th February, 1762.

Be it remembered that the Ticket or order of the late Secretary ~~and~~ Richard Peters dated the 20th of September, 1755, ~~of~~ (which ~~copy~~ is hereto annexed) for a Resurvey of the Proprietaries reserved Tract of five hundred acres at the head of Pequea Creek, ^{according} to the annexed survey and for the division thereof amongst John, Archibald and Andrew, the three sons of Andrew Campbell deced, according to their respective rights under his Will, was founded on a misrepresentation of theirs that their Father had actually purchased of the Proprietaries the whole of the said 500 acres Tract. And it being now discovered on strict search made in all the Offices that the said Andrew Campbell purchased no more than 250 acres of the South end of the said tract, and that tho' he took upon him in his Will to dispose of the sd whole tract yet that he was intitled to no more than the said 250 acres and that he even had not at his Death paid much ~~more~~ more than half the purchase monies and interest for the said 250 as Therefore the Agents of the Proprietaries have now agreed to sell the residue of the said tract being 332^a & 26 perches and allowance for Roads, unto Isaac Richardson Esquire and have desired that a proper Memorandum may be entered in the Secretaries and Surveyor General's Offices upon the said Ticket and the hereto annexed Returns which were made for the said three Sons of the said Andrew Campbell deced, in consequence of the said mistaken Ticket in order to prevent any further proceedings thereon save a Confirmation of the said 250 acres to the proper Representatives of the said Andrew Campbell deced
