



In pursuance of a contract with the Members of the Board of Property of the State of Pennsylvania, dated the first of Novr 1827 and the authority therein specified, the above Tracts of Land was surveyed & calculated by virtue of Application No. 27 calling for five hundred acres of land, granted to George Croghan April the first 1769, by the Proprietary Government, each tract containing two hundred & fifty two acres three fourths & nine perches & all. Situate in the townships of Wilkins, Plumb & Versales in the County of Allegheny
