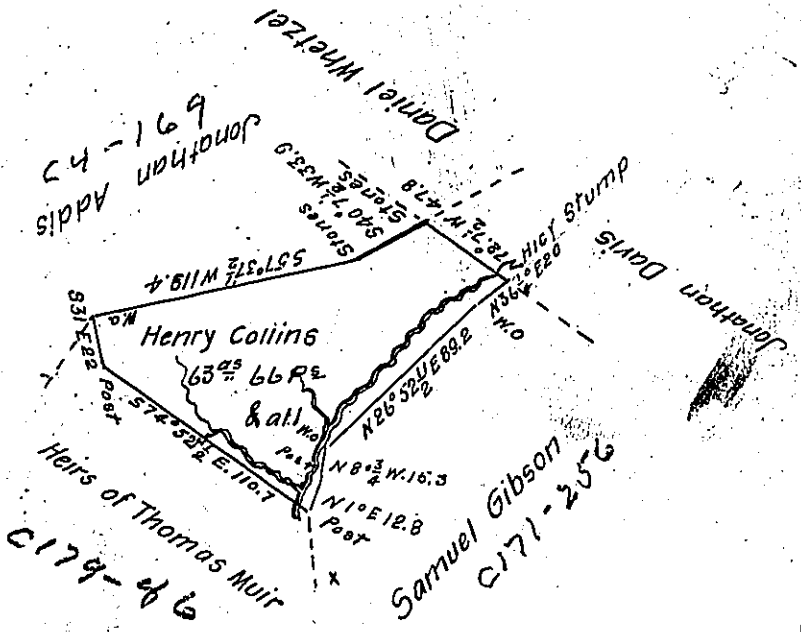


Note

Part of this tract of Land had been previously embraced by a Survey made by one of my Assistants - at the request of the Heirs of Thomas Muir (or by himself) Upon examination of the Witnesses present and hearing the allegations of the parties on the Ground. I was induced to believe the Claim of the heirs of Thomas Muir to that part of Henry Collins's land "embraced as aforesaid" was not reasonably founded. Notwithstanding I admitted a Caveat to be entered which I have since understood to have been either heard by the Honorable Board of Property or given up by the party in opposition VIZ "the heirs of Thomas Muir" In Order to Justify myself I mention the Caveat requested and refer to the decision of the Honorable Board relative thereto
