



PURSUANT to an order of the Board of Property dated 28<sup>th</sup> January, 1802, I have made a re-survey of a tract of land, granted by warrant, dated 22<sup>d</sup> day of February, 1785, to Marcy Martin for four hundred acres, situate on the waters of Tunkhannock Creek in the county of Luzerne. And I have endeavoured to find the lines of three tracts said to be previously surveyed to Messrs. Chew Shippen and Allen, on warrants dated the 20<sup>th</sup> day of August, 1774, for 3000 acres each, with which the above tract is said to interfere. But after a careful and diligent search, no old lines of the said surveys made or pretended to be made, for the said Chew, Shippen and Allen can be found, and it is doubtful whether the same were ever run; but if from the returns in the land office, or any satisfactory evidence, it is concluded that the same were run, or the running thereof legally dispensed with, I find by a comparison of the said returns, according to the waters thereof, with the said tract which I have re-surveyed, that the said tract of land so granted to the said Marcy Martin contains Sixty Two acres and fifty seven perches, with the usual allowance for roads.
