



By virtue of a certain instrument of writing out of the Surveyor General and was surveyed November 1765 unto Michael Strohl by virtue of an order issued from the Surveyor General October the 30th 1765 being numbered 1163 which order was granted in persuance of an application made by said Michael Strohl surveyed November the 8th 1836 for Nicholas Strohl containing seventy four acres and seventy eight perches and the allowance of six per cents for roads &c situate in Towamensing Township in the County of Northampton (it being improved land)
