At the Request of Randal Croxton Heir of Randal Croxton deceased purchaser of 250 Acres that I would grant him to take up one hundred Acres the Remainder of his fathers said purchase. These are to require thee forthwith to Survey or cause to be Survey'd unto him according to the method of Townships by me appointed the said Number of Acres of Land in this Province that has not been already Survey'd nor taken up nor is concealed nor Seated by the Indians And make Returns thereof into my Secretaries Office W<sup>ch</sup> Survey being duly made & Returned shall if seated within twelve months after y<sup>e</sup> date y<sup>r</sup> of be confirmed to him his Heirs and Assigns for ever. Given under my hand and Seal at Philad<sup>ia</sup> 25<sup>th</sup> 1<sup>mo</sup> 1701.
