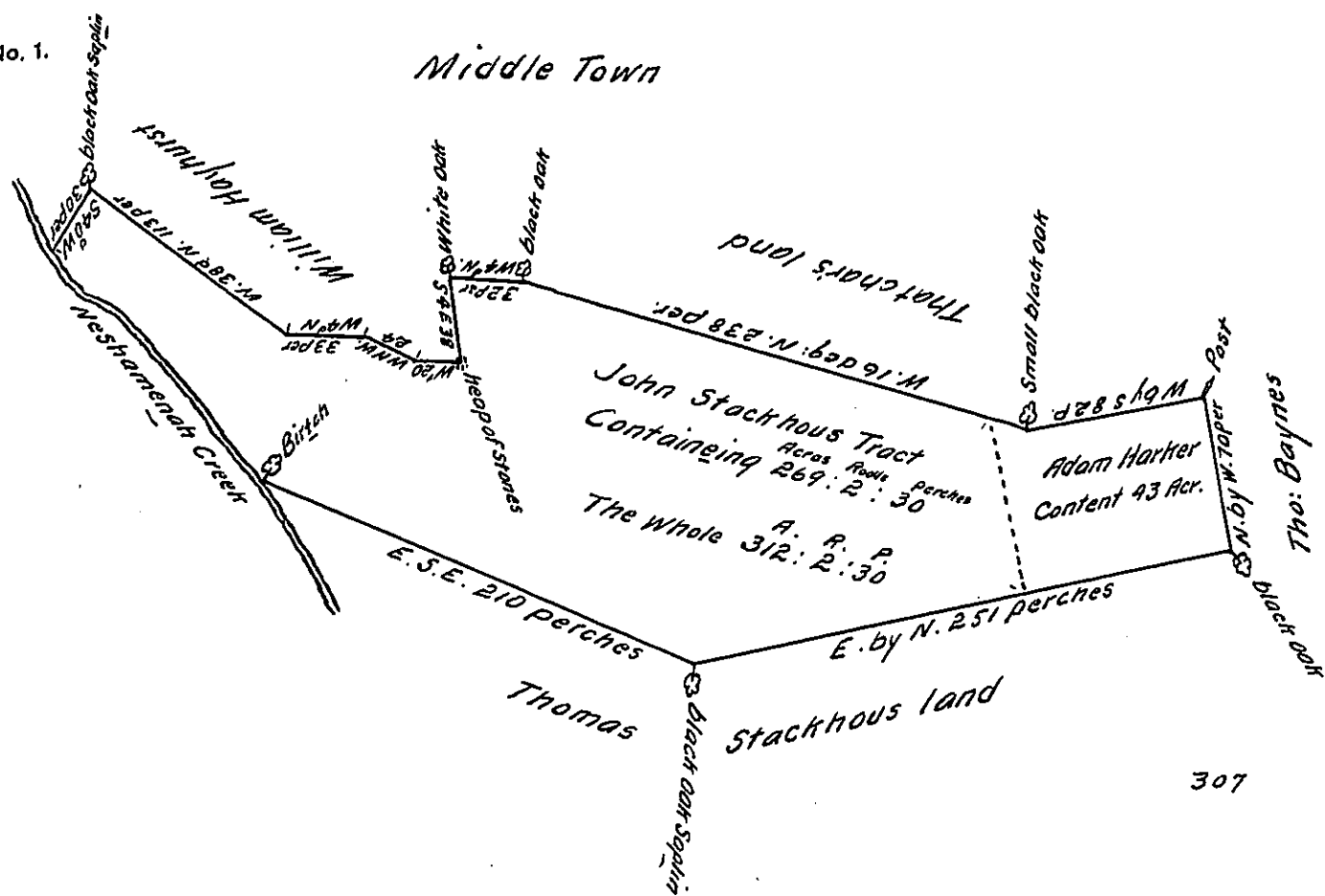

Resurveyed the 10th day of the 11th month 1701 by virtue of a Warrant from the Governour dated the 22^d day of the first month 1702 unto John Stackhous Three hundred and twelve Acres and an half and thirty perches in Middletown in the County of Bucks, Beginning at a corner marked Birtch tree by Neshameneh, Thence E. S. E. 210 perches to a black oak saplin, Then E. by N. by Thomas Stackhous land 251 perches to a Corner marked black oak, Then N. by W. by Thomas Baynes land 70 perches to a Corner Post, Then W. by S. by Thatchar's land 82 perches to a small black oak, Then W. 16. deg. N. 238 perches to a black oak, Then W. 4. deg. 32 perches to a Corner marked white oak at William Hayhurst's Corner, Then S. 4. deg. E. by William Hayhurst land 38 perches to a heap of Stones, Then by the cleare land west 20 per. Then W. N. W. 24 perches Then W. 4. deg. N. 33 per. Then W. 38 deg. N. 113 per. to a small black oak saplin, Then S. 40. deg. W. 30 per. to Neshameneh, Then down the same S. 26. deg. E. 20 per. Then S. 49. deg. E. 24 per. Then S. 33 deg. E. 100 perches to the place of Beginning. There is 269 Acres and an half and thirty perches of this land belonging to the said John Stackhous his tract, and 43 Acres contiguous thereunto purchased from Adam Harter being part of John Scarborough's Tract, and cut off in the Draught by a pricked line This 43 Acres being contiguous to the said John Stackhous's Tract and a small purchase since the date of his Warrant was at the request of the said John Stackhouse annexed in the Returne, for convenience of takein a Patent for the whole.
