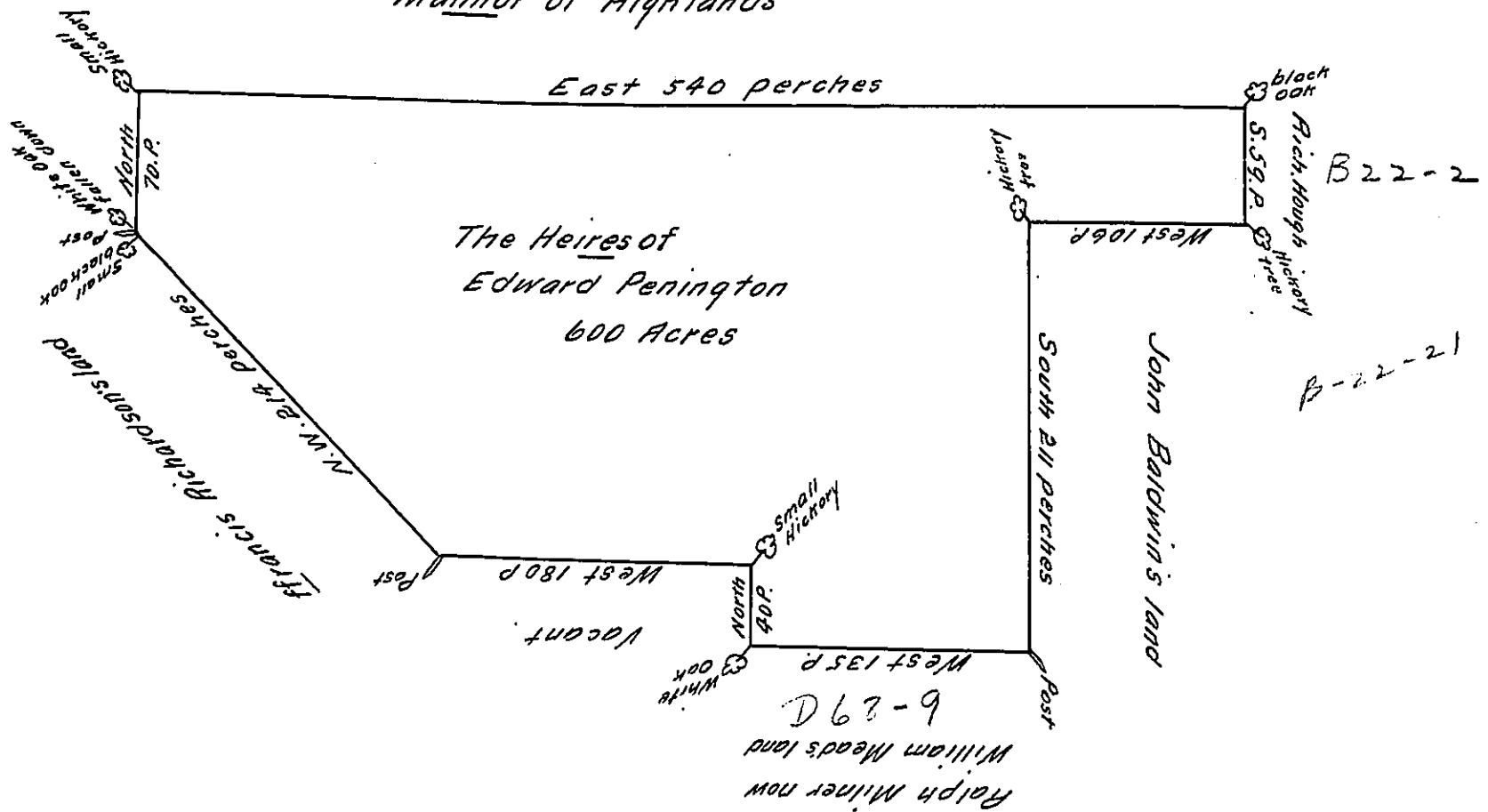


Mannor of Highlands



By virtue of a Warrant under the hand of William Penn Proprietary & Governour of the Province of Pensilvania & Counties annexed directed to Edward Penington Survey Gen<sup>l</sup> of the s<sup>d</sup> Province bearing date the 25<sup>th</sup> 17<sup>th</sup> 1701 to cause to be surveyed to himself the s<sup>d</sup> Edward Penington Six hundred Acres of Land in this Province which hath not been already taken up in Right & as the full Complement of 1250 Acres formerly granted to him by the s<sup>d</sup> Proprietary with the first Purchasers (which s<sup>d</sup> Warr<sup>t</sup> upon the decease of the s<sup>d</sup> Edward Penington was directed to me by the Proprietaries Commissioners the 27<sup>th</sup> 17<sup>th</sup> 1703) Surveyed by virtue thereof unto the Heires of the s<sup>d</sup> Edward Penington. A tract of Land in Makefield township in the County of Bucks in the Province afores<sup>d</sup> Beginning at a Post at the Corner of John Baldwin's Land from thence West by Land laid out to Ralph Milner one hundred thirty five perches to a white Oak, Then by Vacant Land North forty perches to a small Hickory, Then againe by Vacant Land West 180 perches to a Post in Francis Richardson's Line, Then by the s<sup>d</sup> Richardson's Line North West 214 perches to a Post between a small black Oak & a white Oak fallen, Then North by vacant Land 70 perches to a small Hickory, Then East by the Mannor of Highlands 540 perches to a black Oak, Then by Richard Hough's land South 59 perches to a Hickory tree, Then West by the s<sup>d</sup> John Baldwin's land 106 perches to a Hickory tree, Then againe by the s<sup>d</sup> Baldwin's land South 211 perches to the place of beginning Containing Six hundred Acres. Surveyed the 16<sup>th</sup> 17<sup>th</sup> 1707 By me John Cutler
