

I do hereby Certifie That pursuant to a warrant under the hands of the Commiss^{rs}. of property and the Seal of the Province to Phineas Pemberton directed bearing date the 21st. day of the 11th. month 1701. and by vertue of a warrant from the said Commissioners to John Cutler dated the 10th day of the first month 170¹/₂ Authorizing him to Execute all Warrants to the said Pemberton directed The John Cutler hath made Returns into the General Surveyor's office of the Resurvey of a Tract of land Resurvey'd to Joseph Growden the 21st. and 22^d. days of the 2^d. month 1702 which said Survey being Examined & Revised in the said office is as followeth viz^t The said land scitute in Bensalem Township in the County of Bucks Beginning at a birch Tree by Neshameneh Creek at the Corner of John Tatham's land from thence Extending west south west in the said Thatham's line three hundred and sixty perches to a Corner white oak from thence south two hundred and fifty one perches to a Corner white oak. Then [by the heads of Several lotts extending from the River] west south west seven hundred ^{fifty nine} ~~nine~~ ^{by five} perches to a post at Joseph Hirl's Corner by Poetquesink Creek from thence up the several Courses of the said Creek one thousand four hundred and sixty perches to a maple tree at the Corner of Southampton township thence by the said Township line north east six hundred thirty seven perches ~~to~~ to a black oak ^{at} the other Corner of the said Township thence south east two hundred seventy three perches to a white oak by Neshameneh Creek. Thence down the several Courses of the said Creek one thousand two hundred and fifty eight perches to the place of beginning. Containing six thousand five hundred and twenty Acres
