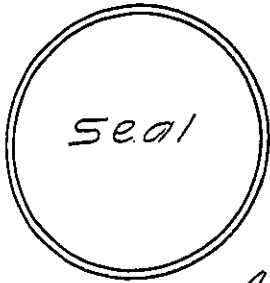

By the Commissioners of Property

At the request of JOHN MORRIS, that we would grant him to take up the last five hundred acres of land remaining of two thousand five hundred acres by him bought of THOMAS FAIRMAN who purchased of THOMAS HARLEY his right to five thousand acres purchased of the Prop<sup>rs</sup>.

These are to require thee forthwith to survey or cause to be survey'd to ye sd JOHN MORRIS according to the method of townships the sd number of five hundred acres of land that has not been already survey'd nor taken up nor concealed nor is seated by ye Indians to be seated by the sd J<sup>n</sup> MORRIS or his assigns within two years after the date hereof otherwise the sd survey to be void and of no other effect than if ye same had never been made and make returns thereof into the Secretaries office.

Given under our hands and the seal of the Province at Philad<sup>a</sup> the 8<sup>th</sup> day of x<sup>br</sup> 1701.
