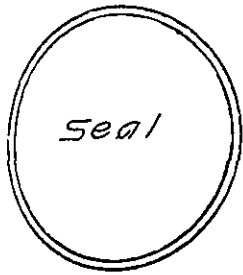


Pennsylvania

By the Commiss^{rs} of Property.

At the request of Peter Taylor old purchaser, that we would grant him to take up two hundred and sixty five acres of land the remainder of his first purchase of 625 acres yet untaken up. These are to require thee forthwith to survey or cause to be survey'd. to the s^d Peter Taylor according to ye method of townships the said number of two hundred and sixty five acres of land in this Province that has not been survey'd nor taken up nor concealed nor seated by the Indians. To be improved and seated by the s^d Peter Taylor or his assigns within two years after survey otherwise the s^d survey to be void and of no other effect than if the same had never been made and make returns thereof to the Secretaries office. Given under our hands and the seal of the Province at Philad^{ia} the 10th day of 10^{br} 1701.
