



By vertue of a warr<sup>t</sup> from Edw<sup>d</sup> Pennington to me directed bearing date the 19<sup>th</sup> day of the 1<sup>th</sup> moneth 170<sup>o</sup>. I doe hereby certifie into his office that I have survey'd and lay'd out for the use of the people called Quakers the Grave Yard now made use off and find it bound on the north side with Mulbery Street 360 foot on the east side with Rich<sup>d</sup> Orms Lott 181 :- on the south with young Morgans Lott 171 :- on another east line bounded w<sup>t</sup> young Morgan and other Lotts from the third street 169 : 1/2 :- upon the south w<sup>t</sup> the end of the High Street Lotts 181 : 1/2 - and upon the west bounded w<sup>t</sup> the fourth street 352 1/2 - and finding it to be in all 94929 feet the complement I say Survey'd the 23<sup>d</sup> day of the 1<sup>th</sup> moneth by me.

IN TESTIMONY that the above is a copy of the original remaining on file in the Department of Internal Affairs of Pennsylvania, made conformably to an Act of Assembly approved the 16th day of February, 1833, I have hereunto set my Hand and caused the Seal of said Department to be affixed at Harrisburg, this fourth day of December 1909
