By the Commissioners of Property.

Whereas the former Commissioners in the year 1692 Granted unto Edward Farmer to take up one hundred acres of land in the Manor of Springfield adjoining to his own land and not to exceed forty perches to the southeast from his said land, which grant having never been confirmed to him, he now requests a Confirmation of the same and that we would further grant to him one hundred acres more to be added to the former for both which he ~~consents~~ agrees to pay to the use of the Proprietor and Trustees One hundred pounds one moiety thereof to be paid the 25<sup>th</sup> day of December next & the other moiety on ye 16<sup>th</sup> day of the 3<sup>d</sup> month (May) following. These therefore are to Authorize thee to survey or cause to be survey'd to the said Edw<sup>d</sup> Two hundred acres of land in the place afores<sup>d</sup> one hundred thereof to be laid out in the Manor herein before mentioned, and the other hundred to be added thereunto in such manner as may be ye least Injurious to the rest of the tract or Manor of Springfield, And make returns thereof into the Secretaries Office. ~~Which~~ <sup>With</sup> which agreem<sup>t</sup> in case the sd Edw<sup>d</sup> duly comply this grant and thy survey shall be valid, otherwise the same shall be utterly void. Given under our hands and the Seal of the Province at Philad<sup>a</sup> the 13<sup>th</sup> of the third month 1713.
