At the request of Thomas Vernon Son of Thomas Vernon deceased first Purchaser of 625 Acres. That I would grant him to take up three hundred and fifteen acres and ten acres of Liberty land in full of the said Purchase. These are to require three forth with to survey or cause to be surveyd unto him according to the Method of townships by me appointed the s<sup>d</sup> number of three hundred and fifteen acres of land in this Province, that has not been already surveyd nor taken up, nor is concealed nor Seated by the Indians w<sup>ch</sup> survey being duly made & returned, shall, if seated within twelve months after date thereof, be confirmed to him his Heirs & assigns forever. Also to survey or cause to be surveyd to the s<sup>d</sup> Thomas Vernon the s<sup>d</sup> number of ten acres of land in the Liberties of Philadelphia and make distinct returns of both the s<sup>d</sup> surveys into my Secretaries office.

Given under my hand and seal at Philadelphia the 20<sup>th</sup> of the <sup>10<sup>th</sup></sup> ~~first~~ month 1709/1.
