

Pursuant to a Warrant under the hand and Seal of the Proprietary and Governour to me directed bearing date the 8th day of the 11th month 1709.

I do hereby certify that I have caused to be Resurveyed unto James Logan Attorney for Edward Watts of Taunton in Somersetshire and his Wife Edith formerly Wife of Matthew Perrin of the said place a certain Tract of Land situate in the County of Philadelphia formerly laid out unto him the said Matthew Perrin for five hundred acres as one moiety of one thousand acres surveyed by virtue of a Warrant from the Proprietary and Governour to him and William Salway, but now found to contain five hundred and forty acres and twenty eight perches, Beginning at a Corner in the Road commonly called the Susquehanna Road being likewise the Corner of an old Line of marked trees which Nicholas Scull alledgeth to be the true and old Line dividing this Tract from the Land bought by Thomas Fitzwater of William Salway, from thence South West by the said Line five hundred twenty and seven perches to a marked Hickery's stump dividing it from part of the manour of Springfield, from thence by an old Line of marked trees North West one hundred sixty and four perches to a Corner of an old Line of marked trees dividing this tract from the said Nicholas Scull's Land, from thence by the said Line North East five hundred twenty and seven perches to the said Susquehanna Road, from thence South East by a Line of marked trees one hundred sixty and four perches to the place of beginning, containing as above expressed. Resurveyed the 27th day of the 12th month, 1709 and Returned according to the above said Resurvey and Bounds into the Proprietary and Governour's Secretary's Office the 16th day of the 2^d month, 1701.
