



John Penn, Thomas Penn, & Richard Penn Esq<sup>s</sup> True and Absolute Proprietors of the Province of Pennsylvania, and counties of Newcastle, Kent and sussex on delaware, to Jacob Taylor Surveyor General or to our Surveyor General for the time being.

Whereas by an agreement made this day between us the said Proprietors the said Richard Penn is to <sup>have</sup> surveyed to him for his own propper use and benefit five thousand acres of land in our said Province. Wee do hereby authorize and require you to survey or cause to be surveyed to him the said Richard Penn his Heirs and assigns, One thousand acres of the said land, in some one place, on land purchased of the Indians, and whereon no persons are seated, reserving a Quitrent of twelve pence, the Hundred acres, Given under our hands and the lesser seal of the said Province at London this 12<sup>th</sup> day of May 1732.
