

We the subscribers arbitrators Indifferently chosen between John Evans & George Willcockson to settle the difference between them concerning their lands do award and order that John Evans shall hold and enjoy the whole tract of land that John Taylor Survey'd for him in the year 1731 paying the said George Willcockson the sum of twenty pounds for all the improvements he has made thereon on or before the 16th of May 1738 on or before which day the said George Willcockson shall surrender & yield up the same land & improvements unto the said John Evans the fences and Buildings being in as good repair as the same now are and that the said George Willcockson shall or may take and use all the corn now growing on the improvement he has made on the said land and sow and plant what summer grain he shall think fitt thereon this present spring with Liberty to take and carry off the same witness our hands this 24th of March 1736/7.
