

Donnegall June, 5th 1759

Sir. Agreeable to orders sent my Brother William Concerning M^r Penns tract of land situate in Paxton Township & Lancaster County. I now make return of the resurvey to you by my Father, first Begin^g at Birch on ye East side of Susquehanna River and extending thence by John Harris's Land: N 65^d E 252 perches to an Elm-tree on Bank of Paxton Creek Thence by James Alcorns land N 1^d W 138 perches to B.O Thence by said N 9^d E 92 1/2 perches to where James Galbreath's land intercepts the Man^r at a post. Thence by s^d Galbreath 5 44^d W 92 to an Ash on Bank of Paxton Creek. Thence by s^d up the Creek on its several Courses 274 1/2 to Linn-tree, thence by s^d east 122 1/2 perches to Birch. Thence by Arthur Forster Upon the course above mentioned extended by the Prick'd line N 9^d E 5 perches to B.O. Thence by s^d Forster N 40^d W 16p to post Cor between Forster and James Potts, But the whole distance of sd Course is 94p to Chest-oak Thence by Potts N. 81^d W 32p to W.O Corner between Potts and Widdow Armstrong. But whole distance of the above mentioned Course, is 388 Perches to spanish oak on bank of River Susquehanna thence down the River on its severall Courses E 689 Perches to place of Beginning. The above are the courses and dista^{nces} of the land as it now lies (James Galbreath's land Reducted.) Sir the first times I went upon the land the chain^{men} made a blunder therefore, I thought it would not signify to send thier Qualifications and waited untill my brother William came from Philadelphia on which I led the chain-myself and assures you I took the greatest care imaginable
