



By the Proprietaries.

Whereas Andrew Thomson of the County of York hath requested that we would ~~grant~~ ~~to take up~~ grant unto him our warrant for ~~one~~ One hundred & twenty five acres of land joining James Wilson Elizabeth Wilson, James Thomson & William Rarrisey in Harrilton ~~Bar~~ township being part of Thirty Thousand acres of land which by our warrant of the eighteenth day of June 1741. We directed our then Surveyor General to survey on the Branches of Marsh Creek on the West side of the River Sasquehanna then in the County of Lancaster now York for our own proper Use and the same to return under the Name & style of our Manor of Maske And it appearing to us that the said one hundred & twenty five acres of land was settled before the issuing our said Warrant for the said Manor. We have notwithstanding condescended and agreed to grant the same to the said Andrew Thomson on the then common Terms the Interest & Quitrent commencing from the 1<sup>st</sup> day of March 1741. being the time of the settlement of sd 125 acres ~~in the County of~~ And for which he agrees to pay to our Use, within the Term of six months from the date hereof, at the rate of Fifteen Pounds Ten shillings, current Money of this Province, for every Hundred acres; and also to pay the yearly Quitrent of One Halfpenny Sterling for every acre thereof, to us, our Heirs and Assigns for ever: These are therefore to authorise and require you to survey, or cause to be surveyed unto the said Andrew Thomson at the place aforesaid, according to the townships appointed, the said Quantity of One hundred & twenty five acres, ~~if not already surveyed or appointed~~ and make return thereof into the Secretary's Office, in order for Confirmation; for which this shall be your sufficient warrant: Which warrant and survey, in case the said Andrew Thomson fulfil the above agreement within six months from the date hereof, shall be valid, otherwise void. Given under my Hand, and the seal of the Land-Office, by virtue of certain Powers from the said Proprietaries, at Philadelphia, this sixteenth day of April Anno Domini One Thousand seven hundred and sixty five
