

By virtue of a warrant from the Commiss<sup>rs</sup> of Property dated the 2<sup>d</sup> day of the 3<sup>d</sup> month 1704 for resurveying unto William Penn Jun<sup>r</sup> that tract of land scituate - Schuylkill — commonly his manor.

Resurvey'd the 31<sup>st</sup> day of the month and year afores<sup>d</sup>  
 The said Manor beginning at a hickery tree at the corner of Plimoth Township standing by the River Schuylkill - thence extending by the line of the said Plimoth Township north east nine hundred and thirty-four perches to a second hickery tree thence by Whitpair's Township northwest one thousand and sixty perches to a white oak then south west by the <sup>Manor of Gilberts</sup> ~~line of the London Companies Land~~ One thousand five hundred and fourteen perches to a dog tree by Schuylkill - Then down the said river on several courses to the place of the beginning. Containing Seven Thousand four hundred and eighty acres. Resurvey'd by David Powel and returned into the General Survey<sup>rs</sup> Office the 4<sup>th</sup> of <sup>7</sup>/<sub>7</sub> 1704
