William Penn Absolute Proprietary and Governour  
in Chief of the Province of Pensilvania—and Counties Annex-  
ed.

Whereas by my Order to my Comm<sup>rs</sup> bearing date the 15<sup>th</sup> day  
of the fifth Month 1686 I granted to Theodore Siepman Purchaser  
of five Thousand Acres one Acre of Land in Some Convenient  
Street within the City of Philadelphia, In pursuance of which Ord<sup>e</sup>  
my S<sup>d</sup> Comm<sup>rs</sup> granted a Warrt for the laying out the S<sup>d</sup> Acre bear-  
ing date the 15<sup>th</sup> of the 12<sup>th</sup> Mo<sup>th</sup> 1689 directed to Tho: Holme but was  
never executed These therefore are to require thee to survey or  
cause to be survey'd to the s<sup>d</sup> Theodore Siepman one acre of  
land in the City of Philadelphia afores<sup>d</sup> in some convenient  
street thereof, not interfering with the first purchasers and  
make returns thereof into my Secretaries office.
