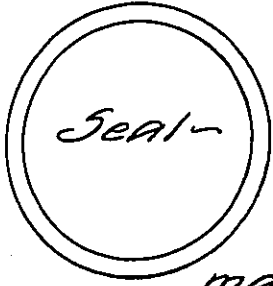


Pensilvania. 5.5



By the Commissioners of Property.

At the Request of James Steel that we would Grant him to take up among the new Surveys made back in this Province the quantity of one Thousand acres of land either in one or more parcels for which he agrees to pay to the Propriety <sup>Trustees</sup> use one hundred Pounds Money of Pensilvania for the whole and the yearly quitrent of one Shilling Sterling for each hundred Acres. These are to Authorize & Require thee to Survey or cause to be Survey'd unto the Said James Steel among the late Surveys made in this Province as aforesaid the said quantity of one Thousand Acres of Land in one Tract or more, That has not been heretofore Survey'd nor appropriated nor is Seated by the Indians and make Returns thereof into the Secretarys Office which Survey in case the said James fulfill the above agreement within six Months after the date hereof shall be valid otherwise the same is to be void as if it had never been made nor this Warrant ever granted. Given under our hands & Seal of ye Province at Philadelphia the 1st day of Septembr. Anno Dni 1718.
