

By virtue of a Warrant ^{from} the Commissioners of Property dated the 30th day of March in the year 1720 there was survey'd for Thomas Shute on the first day of April in the same year 1720 a certain tract of land in the County of Philadelphia containing one hundred and sixty acres being the remainder of Samuel Allen's original purchase of two thousand acres whose grandson John Sisom to whom the said one hundred and + sixty acres descended granted + convey'd the same to the said Thomas Shute.

Beginning at a post at a corner of a tract of land lately survey'd to James Steel and the said Thomas Shute and running by the said land South West two hundred forty six perches then North West by by another line of the said James Steel's and Thomas Shute's tract one hundred and ten perches then North East two hundred + forty six perches then South East one hundred and ten perches to the place of beginning containing one hundred and sixty acres with allowance of about six acres per cent.

Returned into the Secretary's office the 30th day of April 1720.
