

Philip Sawman of Morris Township in Huntingdon County in the State of Pennsylvania avers and declares that in the month of May 1777 he enlisted in the Continental Army as a Private with Captain William Weir in the 11<sup>th</sup> Pennsylvania Regiment commanded by Colo. Adam Hatley, that, from Captain Weir's Company he was transferred to Captain Powers' Company in the 6<sup>th</sup> Pennsylvania Regiment commanded by Colonel Humphreys, that, from Captain Powers' Company he was transferred to Captain John Doyle's Company, in the same Regiment, that, with Captain Doyle, he marched to the Green Springs in Virginia, and was in the Battle fought there, in 1781, from thence he marched with the Continental Army to Williamsburg and from thence to Yorktown where he acted in the capture of the British Army under General Lord Cornwallis after which he was transferred into Captain Walter Tunny's Company, in the 1<sup>st</sup> Pennsylvania Regiment, commanded by Colonel Hamer, and marched with that Regiment to Rouss and joined General Green's Army, and with it marched to Jackson'sborough and there he was drafted into Captain Sawman's Company, in the first Regiment and remained in that Company, as a Private until the end of the war, that in the month of August 1783 he was regularly discharged, that, his discharge by length of time was worn out and destroyed, that, he avers and declares that, altho he was in the service of the United States, and in the Pennsylvania Line, for the
