

I do hereby certify that Eleanor McKee was introduced to me in Greensburgh by Alexander McKee, the brother of James McKee Deceased, the said Alexander informed me, that she the said Eleanor is the widow of his brother James, that she the said Eleanor had two Daughters by the said James Both of which are Married and in full life, that his Brother died after the close of the Revolutionary war

I further certify - that I applied in behalf of the said widow, at the war Office in the City of Washington (in writing) for Military bounty land, I received for answer that a warrant had issued for 100 acres of land to some person in Phila, whose name I now forget, in virtue of an agreement made by the said James in his lifetime.

The said Eleanor had at the time she applied to me ^{travelling} from some one of the ^{near} ~~eastern~~ ^{eastern} ~~located~~ ^{located} west of the Allegheny appeared frail. has since often sent and written to me to know the result of her application, I am the agent only of the poor woman. have neither Interest nor Expectation of interest - I have no Doubt of the Justice of the Claim and as the name of the said James appears on the record as entitled. I hope there will be no Difficulty in granting the land.
