

Be it known, That I George Smith late private Soldier in the second Pennsylvania

regiment commanded by Colonel Richard Humphreys or any other Officers or Officers in the service of the United States of North America, hath made, ordained, and constituted and by these presents do make, ordain and constitute, and in my place and stead put and depute Frederick Molineux of the City of Philad. my true and lawful attorney, irrevocably for me, and in my name and stead, but to the sole use of him the said Frederick Molineux his heirs and assigns forever; to ask, demand, and by all lawful means recover and receive all such sum or sums of money, as well as grants or confirmations, lands and tenements, or other demands whatsoever by the United States or the state of Pennsylvania or any person or persons acting under their authority, and I also give and grant unto my said attorney full power and absolute authority, to sell and dispose of all and singular the lands, tenements, gratuities and donations, which I may be entitled to, or of right may claim, in virtue of an act of the United States in Congress assembled or under the authority of Pennsylvania for or by reason of my having served in the said second or any other regiment of the Army of Pennsylvania line and by good and sufficient assurance in the law, to grant, convey and confirm to the purchaser or purchasers, the fee simple and inheritance thereof, hereby granting unto my said attorney, full power and authority to appoint one or more attorneys under him or them, for the purposes aforesaid; ratifying and confirming all and singular whatsoever my said attorneys shall or may do in the premises by virtue hereof: In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fourteenth day of July in the year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and ninety two
