



Steph Shack has entered a caveat against ^{the} acceptance of a return of the above Survey which I have made for Henry Hess. Henry Hess's Warrant ^{is} dated the 28th January 1750 for 25⁰ adjoining his other Land of John Keim near Oley Philadelphia County ^{now} ~~late~~ the County of Berks. Steph Shack's Warrant dated the 7th February 1752 for 50⁰ more or less adj^g George Oyster & Henry Hess with Interest from the Year 1748.

Steph Shack, as appears from the evidence of George Oyster & John Keim, settled on a piece of land which Henry Hess intended to get a warrant for, adjoining his other Land, and by agreement was to make a small Improvement & continue on it for six years after which Term he was to give Hess peaceable Possession, and accordingly removed to the Place where he now lives. After which upon a presumption that Hess had no warrant, Shack obtained a warrant of the above date. My Opinion of the Case is, which accords with the sentiments of all the neighbours with whom I have conversed, that Hess is exceedingly mild in regard of Shack, & he ought at least to have the quantity of Land which I have surveyed to him
