



By virtue of a Warrant from the Proprietaries dated the 20<sup>th</sup> Day of December Anno Dom. 1736 Surveyed unto Sebastian Jaglin a Certain Tract of Land situate on a Branch of a Coccoosing Creek in the County of Lancaster Beginning at a marked Black Oak at a Corner of Detrick Morte-hall's Land Thence extending by the same North 20 Degs west 37 P's to a Post Thence by Vacant Land the several Courses and Distances following Viz. South 75 Degs West 104 P's to a Gum Tree South 57 Degs west 35 P's to a White Oak North 62 Degs West 30 P's to a White oak West 170 P's to a Post South 15 Degs West 74 P's to a Black oak S 85 1/2 East 44 P's to a Chestnut North 51 Degs East 84 P's to a White oak South 55 Degs East 100 P's to a Chestnut North 39 Degs East 100 P's to a Beech and North 64 1/2 Degs East 96 P's to the place of Beginning Containing 148 as and the usual Allowance for Roads &c. Surveyd ye 11<sup>th</sup> Day of July 1737.
