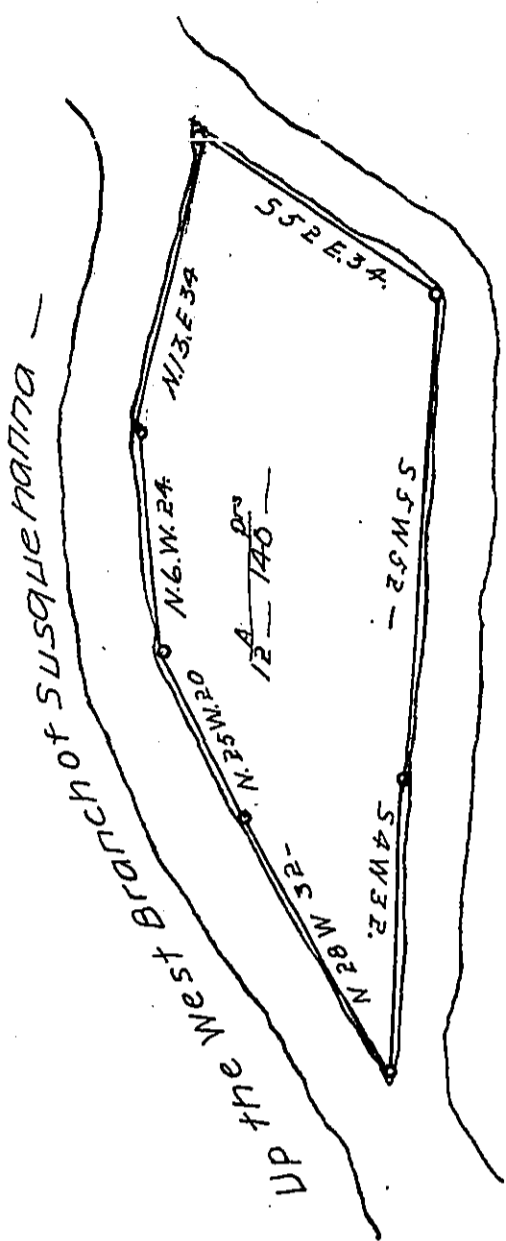


FORM NO. 1.



Pursuant to an Order of the Board of Property to us directed, Dated at Philadelphia on the 14th day of May 1793, We on the 27th day of May 1794. at the Request of James Black, Surveyed the Above discribed Island containing twelve Acres & One Hundred & Forty Perches Strict Measure, Situate in the West Branch of the River Susquehanna Nearly opposite to Mill Town, and opposite to a Plantation of the Said James Black on the Eastern Bank of said West Branch, and on enquiry and carefull examination, we find there is About eight Acres of the said Island Under Cultiva-

tion, the soil good but great part subject to frequent overflowings, the Timber is Prinsipally Maple Buttonwood and Water Birch, suitable for Nothing but firewood &c it Appears from the best information that this Island was improv'd About the year 1770. by Marcus Hewlings, we cannot learn that it has ever been Survey'd for the Use of the late Proprietaries, but we are of Oppinion it Never hath been, we likewise learn that no Advantage can be Deriv'd from Fishing on said Island as it hath been frequently tryed without sucksess, Distance from the main Shore on the east side About Forty Perches & from the West About Sixty perches &c

We are therefore taking the Premises into full View Unanimously of oppinion that the Said Island, is not Worth more than three Pounds P^r Acre Given under Our Hand this 30th MAY 1794 -
